However, on Communion Sunday, I received Andrew's permission to take Communion to him. Elder Kay Ebbs represented the congregation as the Elder in attendance. Many members of Pauline's family from California were there visiting, and they complimented Pauline on the service.

I felt most honored in continuing to talk with Andrew up until a few days before his death and being with Pauline when I visited during Andrew's naps. Founding Elder Andrew Wise entered the Church Triumphant at home, as he wished, on the morning of July 17th. Elder Janis Bomar and I were with Pauline from the time

the EMS took Andrew to the hospital until after visiting the funeral home. I truly don't know what I would have done without Janis' sacred presence. Pauline's family arrived a couple of days later. The Fellowship team was absolutely awesome, and the Worship Committee prepared the sanctuary with reverence and dignity. The music of John Tucker and Brittany Roughton was blessed! I hold our Elders in the highest esteem.

A few women in the church have started an informal Lunch Bunch, every other Thursday, at noon. So far we haven't eaten at the same restaurant twice. We meet next on August 9th at Satchel's Pizza. Dianne Felts and Judy Newell join in, glad to keep up with women from CPC.

On July 8th, I trained members of Council and other interested Elders in making home and institutional visits and serving Communion. The church office provides Elders with service bulletins and a communion kit. If you are aware of someone who is shut-in in any way, phone them or their family to ask if they'd like a

If you want to speak at a Council meeting, first please speak to the Pastor, Clerk of Council or one of the Ruling Elders who will help you decide the best course for your issue. Don't be alarmed if they

redirect you to one of the committees to address your concerns. If you are approved to address the Council, you will be notified and there is a procedure for your participation. The new policy has been placed on the bulletin board in Fellowship Hall and outlines both the Council's responsibilities and behaviors, along with yours as a congregation member. Wendy Firman recently observed at a Council meeting and told us that every member of the congregation should attend to see how decisions are made. She was amazed at the detail of the content and the knowledge of all Elders.

Meditation Trail - Dog Days of Summer

It's hot and buggy - what more do I need to say? With Easter long since past, it wasn't Peter Cottontail hopping down the



bunny trail that I saw last month, but the trail was really hopping with thousands of tiny frogs! Although I was walking very quickly to stay ahead of the mosquitos, there was something moving as slow as a turtle along the path one day. Oh, that's right – it *was* a turtle! I didn't stop long enough to confirm what kind it was, but it could have been a pond slider – yellow on the underside with dark patches along the edges.

Should you brave the trail this month, note the peacock ginger plants (*Kaempferia pulchra* var. *masonii*) blooming at each end of the bridge with pinkish-lavender flowers. Also look for the orchid pansy plants (*Achimenes grandiflora*) at several places along the trail. They have soft

hairy leaves that are dark green on top, but reddish below with reddish-purple flowers almost two inches in diameter. The pinecone lilies (*Zingiber zerumbet*) will be blooming on the south side of the trail between the bridge and the Y of the trail. Small white flowers will be peeking out of the "pine cones" that will turn bright red later this fall. Many of



the gingers will be blooming and you may also see the purple flowered composite (*Vernonia gigantea* or ironweed) plants across from the sinkhole or near the CPC end of the trail. Pokeweed plants (*Phytolacca americana*) in the sinkhole also will be blooming, with tiny white flowers and ¼-inch purplish-black berries in elongated clusters.

Meet Your Council Participants


[Ed. note: This is the last of a series that has profiled our congregation's leaders. Preceeding issues have each featured two or three of these dedicated servants.]

Susan Nimmo, Class of 2014. Susan joined CPC in 1999 and most recently was re-elected as a ruling elder for a three-year term. She has assumed responsibilities as Chair of the Nominating Committee and of the



Christian Nurture and Education Committee. She has a flair for working with the youth and teaching Sunday School, has been instrumental in providing craft stations at Vacation Bible School each year, and has also introduced the Christian Dental Students from Shands, with their mission to provide free dental services to the needy in other countries while also sharing the "Good News." Susan has also been a faithful participant in Koininia, our Thursday evening small group. Her term on Council ends in December. 2014.

Larry Herrington, Class of 2014. Larry joined CPC in 2010 and hasn't stopped since. He was recently elected as a ruling elder for a three-year term. Due to health issues, Larry has resigned

John Tucker, Clerk of Council. John joined CPC in 2001 and has been a musical addition to our worship with his flute and alto flute. John also plays with the Gainesville Flute Ensemble, which rehearses at CPC and offers



a free Christmas concert to the congregation and community. John is a former ruling elder at the church, but currently serves as the elected Clerk of Council. John also serves as the Financial Secretary for CPC and helps to keep all of us on track from a financial perspective. John sets the church up every Sunday morning, arriving very early, unlocking the building, and setting up the projector and sound system. He is our "utility infielder." John's term as Clerk of Council continues for one year and can be extended by vote of the Council.

Laura Joost-Kuhn, Moderator of Council.

We received Laura as our third Pastor in January, 2011, and it has been a whirlwind since then. We commend her for her patience and tolerance towards all of us. Did you know that in her secular life she ran a soup kitchen? Our Christmas Dinner, 2010, at St. Francis House was like a coming home for her. Laura wrote

in a letter to CPC upon her acceptance as Pastor. "My interest in the impoverished and otherwise marginalized persons came about during my high school years. Although I came from an affluent household, some of my close friends did not. As I spent more time with them and their families and read the Gospel of Jesus Christ, I realized that I desired to walk more closely with Christ through serving him with the poor and otherwise needy. Since adulthood, I have been involved in social action to benefit the disenfranchised wherever I have lived because their poverty and infirmity affect not only their lives, but those of us who are better off. Our souls, our very spirits, are affected. This is not to say that our spirits are unaffected by the suffering of our more comfortable neighbors or selves; often, the people with whom we may be in contact the most, including the person sitting next to us in church, may be suffering terribly, physically, mentally or spiritually. As your

pastor, my door will always be open to you, and I will be but a phone call away when I am physically unavailable. I ask for your prayers that I may fulfill Christ's Call to be your good shepherd and neighbor." Laura's term as Moderator of Council lasts

as long as her ministry at CPC.
