Meditation Trail Growing (Going?) Bananas!

The progression of blooming plants should continue this month. During the first part of the month, the bear's foot plant (*Smallanthus uvedalius*), with yellow aster-like flowers, should be blooming near the cut-down trees at the ASLC end of the trail (between Sign Posts

#1 & 2). This is an interesting plant! The root was used by the North American Indians as a stimulant and laxative remedy. The root is said to have a beneficial effect on the liver, stomach, and spleen and may be taken to relieve indigestion and counteract liver malfunction. It is said to be of great use when applied externally to stimulate hair growth and is an ingredient of many hair lotions and ointments. A poultice of the bruised root has been used as a dressing and salve on burns, inflammations, and cuts. <code>However</code> - I would consult your doctor before trying any of these!

Another interesting plant growing this year is an ornamental banana tree in the sinkhole, of all places (Sign Post #7)! Eight years ago, one started growing in the stream behind Sign Post #1. The current one is blooming and small bananas (with bright pink skins) are forming on it. Check it out but don't stop too long - the mosquitos are back for the summer!

The dwarf palmetto plants (Sabal minor), with minute white flowers on 6 - 8 foot flower spikes, should bloom during the month near Sign Post #6. The spiral ginger plants (Costus sp.) in the flowerbed at the CPC end of the trail (Sign Post #12) should start blooming mid-month. If you are lucky, you may see an agapanthus plant (Agapanthus praecox) blooming with light lavender flowers between Sign Posts #3 & 4, along with maroon crinum lilies and garden montbretiia (Crocosmia crocosmiliflora) in the same area. Bidens pilosa (Spanish needles) will be blooming along the edge of the woods by the CPC end of the trail.
